Opera rookies, huddle up! It's time for another addition of THE ROOKIE CORNER!

The questions we've heard most over the past month (since the curtain came down on The Elixir of Love) are all about stage direction. Who decided to make the table squeak? Who decided Nemorino should be smart instead of stupid (like he usually is) and that Adina should be his friend, and not just a mean lady (like she usually is). Are there always two little kids at the beginning? NO?! Well, whose idea was THAT?! In fact, we've heard stage direction questions from so many of you that we've decided to dedicate TWO issues of the Singing Telegram Rookie Corner to this topic.

We know that the composer writes the notes that are sung and played. We know that the librettist writes the words that they sing. We learned in a recent Rookie Corner about the role of the conductor. So now, to help us understand what the Stage Director does, we've enlisted the help of Bradley Greenwald, who directed The Elixir of Love, and who came up with so many of those moments of pure delight.

Q: What does a Stage Director do?

BG: The stage director conducts all the physical movement on the stage, and is responsible for the emotional communication of the storytelling, and if s/he is feeling bold, adding an interpretation to the original, like setting the story at Woodstock, or on a movie set, or in a pet store. When generous designers are involved (like at LOON!), the director has input on scenic and lighting elements, too. The music is the bailiwick of the conductor.

Q: How do you decide where / when you want to set the story - and basically, how do you decide the story you want to tell outside the score *?

That depends on the individual opera-- some of these chestnuts were written in short order, like TV scripts that get churned out week after week, and sometimes the dramaturgy (the integrity of the rules of the storytelling) is a little lax, which can put off a modern audience. Today's audiences have a sophisticated palette when it comes to storytelling because of all the stories they watch on a screen. So the director has to make sure the humanity or the absurdity of the characters and story get a lot of attention. The director's job is to make sure the characters match the depth of the music (which is usually more subtle and profound than the wisp of a story). It also depends on whether it's a comedy or tragedy, a farce or satire-then the director might rely on updating the setting into a frame of reference that not only heightens the emotional charge of the words and music, but lets the audience relax into a world that's more familiar to them, a frame of reference that means something to a contemporary audience and then allows the words and music to work their magic. Of course, this is all hard work from both the director and the performing artists, because they have to find the individual moments that make this all work. But that would be another question for later!

*Glossary word: The score is the printed music. Usually singers use a score that just shows the piano part and the vocal parts. The conductor's score shows what EVERY instrument is doing!!

In the next issue, we'll ask Bradley Greenwald how he got into directing, how staging an opera differs from staging a musical or a straight play, and whether a singer's voice or their appearance is more important – among several other questions submitted by LOON patrons!
